The meaning in Arabic of TAMAM is; generous. TAMIM means strong, solid. The Bani or Banu TAMIM are one of the main tribes of Arabia, of ancient origin. Abu Tammami was a Syrian poet ( 805-845 ) known for compiling the Hamasa, extraordinary anthology of Arabic literature. TAMAM, in Turkish means mature, complete, accurate, agree, " 34 OK;.In ancient Hebrew ( biblical ) also means: finishing, complete; and it has been reflected in numerous passages of the old testament.

## **ver significado de colono**

"Settler " it comes from the latin " 34 colonus; ( 41 Labrador; which in turn derives from " colere " ( cultivate ). Thus, the person who is established in a place to work on it would be a " settler " and " Cologne " This place or territory.
